The media often reflects on 'soft power' in terms of personalities who though they have no Power (with a capital P) - nevertheless they can effect and affect public opinion and causes. Clearly we see many examples of 'soft' impressive attraction in the words, actions and miracles of Jesus. Latterly we have heard about his preaching and calling of the apostles; his healing and teaching. Each of us can recall many examples in the Scriptures; but we mustn't miss out on the strong and 'hard' moments in the ministry of Jesus. Last Sunday, he exorcised an evil spirit from a man possessed. This Sunday he again casts out devils. It is a temptation for modern people to perhaps regard such 'works of Christ' as medieval. Yet, one of the things that the pandemic is teaching us is perhaps we are not quite as clever and sophisticated as we previously thought. Humbly we have to step back and, accepting the 'soft' teaching of Jesus, we also need to accept with trust the power Jesus Christ has over evil forces and circumstances. (Father Michael)

### Ash Wednesday and the 40 days of Lent 2021

Later this month on February 17 we will observe ASH WEDNESDAY. It begins the holy season of Lent - this year under COVID restrictions. Masses will be at 9.30am and 8pm. This year - priests are not allowed to touch or mark the foreheads of those attending. Instead, after Mass - Father Michael will be in the car park (weather permitting). Maintaining social distance, Father Michael will SPRINKLE ashes on the top of the head of each person. Yes, there is something very significant about the dark mark of ash visible on our foreheads - but for this year we have to look after and protect each other.

During Lent on Friday evening at 7pm we will have Stations of the Cross with Holy Communion. In other words - not a Mass but still our Lenten observance and sharing in the powerful Way of the Cross.
