19th SUNDAY OF ORDINARY TIME (Year C)

The **Order** of Mass can be followed **from p.7** in the red Parish Mass Book. (On Sundays Eucharistic Prayer 3 or 1 is used; and Memorial Acclamation A or C.) The **Readings** for today's Masses are to be found on **pp 121-24** in the red Parish

Mass Book, including the Psalm and Alleluia. The Congregational Psalm response: Happy are the people the Lord has chosen as his own.

The two central concepts that defined God's relationship with His people, and with us all as individuals, surface in today's scripture readings: they are *Covenant* and *Adoption*. The people of Israel were acutely aware that a **covenant**—a pact or bond—had been established between God and themselves at the very outset of their status as "*chosen* people". God's faithfulness to that bond was absolute; His resolve to *stick to his side of the bargain* in no way compromised by the Hebrews wavering, countless disloyalties, and sometimes open rebellion. The covenant God puts in place is an expression of His *unmerited and unshakeable love*. Naturally enough, then, at a very early stage the people conceived of God as a *father*, a *parent* certainly, a notion which was of course central to the teaching of Jesus and defined his relationship with God. Paul highlights the theme of **adoption** by this divine parent often in his writings. Through Baptism,

our death to sin, we become brothers and sisters of the Lord Jesus, so He makes us become sons and daughters

of His Father. As an earthly mother or father remains such for life—you can't turn the clock back and cease to be a parent—so too God permanently, eternally, is our adopting father. And that relationship shapes God's attitude to all of us.

First Reading (Old Testament): Wisdom 18.6 – 9 The oldest stories of the Old Testament (old *covenant*) that defined the identity of the chosen people were those of the emancipation from slavery in Egypt and the journey across the Red Sea. Similarly Christian identity is fundamentally defined by the Easter story of emancipation – the journey from night to day, from darkness to light, sin to holiness, death to life. The age-old tradition of keeping a night vigil of prayer has its *roots* in these stories of our *origins*. The night is when God is most active: He acts when we sleep! He created Eve when Adam was in deep sleep. God is at his most creative when man is not observing. It was during Easter night that the resurrection took place, and there were no witnesses. The vigil we keep at Easter is a reminder that God acts in the night: in the light of day *we discover the things he has already done*!

Second Reading (New Testament): Hebrews 11.1–2, 8–19 The eleventh chapter of the (anonymous) Letter 'to the Hebrews' highlights the *essential* virtue of *faith*. Faith doesn't involve any special knowledge or vision. It is simply the *assurance* (not just the optimism) that what we *hope for* is *true*. In other words what gives us *security,* and colours all our beliefs, is the *promise* of God's will and goodness towards us that we accept as being fundamentally trustable. The Old Testament examples that the letter mentions suggest that faith involves *letting go* of what up until now we considered securities, to embrace new ones that come to us from God. (At home look up the third temptation of Jesus – Matthew 4.9–10 to see what Jesus makes of this.) The biblical stories make clear to us that faith involves *not a desperate leap in the <u>dark</u> but the assuring embrace of a <u>guarantee</u> from God.*

Gospel: Luke 12.32—48 This gospel extract introduces us again to the notion of Israel as a sentry – someone who's *always* on the look-out, always scanning the horizon. This notion is very prominent in Advent. The prophets are the 'sentries' of the people, even if they are not always listened to when they raise their voices. Last week we read about the farmer being overtaken by a sudden death, and today the gospel issues a warning call to us all to be *ever vigilant*. None of us knows the hour at which any one of us will be called. By the time Luke's gospel was in circulation among the early Christians they had abandoned a simple expectation of Jesus's immediate second coming. And yet they were still warned to be ever vigilant, ever on the look-out. It's as much of a warning to us now, as it was to them then!

THE RELICS OF ST BERNADETTE OF LOURDES are touring England, Wales and Scotland this autumn, for the first time ever. You may remember the relics of St Therese of Liseaux touring in 2009. Westminster Cathedral then ordered in 100,0000 candles!! Please see timetable on notice board for the liturgies at the Cathedral.
