Scripture reflection: Jesus announces his mission

As always, in today's first reading from the Old Testament we see a tie to the Gospel message with a prefiguring of what Jesus will do in the Gospel. The events in the first reading take place about a century after the Jewish exiles were allowed to return from Babylonia to Jerusalem after a lengthy exile. Life has not been easy. The people have suffered from hostile neighbours and crop failures. Ezra, priest and scribe comes to read the Law of Moses to the assembled crowd and explains it to them. It was so long since the people had heard the scriptures, that they all listened attentively and when they realised how far they had departed from the law, they were filled with grief.

When writing his Gospel Luke continually quotes the scriptures of the Old Testament. He wants to show that the events he describes were foretold, and that they truly fulfil God's word. God has been faithful to His promise to send a saviour.

In the Gospel today, we hear from Luke that Jesus is in his hometown of Nazareth, attending the synagogue on the Sabbath. As Jesus stands in the synagogue, he reads from the scroll handed to him; it contains the words of the prophet Isaiah and this prophesy defines Jesus' ministry. Jesus tells the people that he has come to bring good news, in accordance with God's ancient promise. He urges them to watch how he will literally fulfil the words of Isaiah when he heals the sick, gives sight to the blind, sets the downtrodden free. But he wants them to understand that these great acts point to a deeper, more radical healing. For he has come to liberate those in captivity to sin, and to death. He has come to open people's eyes to the love and goodness of his Father, and to overcome their separation from Him and from one another.

We are charged with the task of continuing the mission that Jesus began. Jesus set the framework for all of us when he announced his ministry in today's Gospel. The Holy Spirit enables the Church to continue the mission of Jesus. When we do what Jesus did—bring glad tidings to the poor, liberty to captives, healing to the sick, and freedom to the oppressed—we serve the Kingdom of God. (MR)

### A MESSAGE FROM MGR. JEREMY FAIRHEAD

I write simply to introduce myself to you as the Cardinal has asked that for a short period I act as your Parish Priest until a successor to Fr Michael is found and then eventually arrives. Sometimes a period such as this can be very productive with people finding new ways to look out for each other and to be generous with their talents and gifts. I genuinely hope that we can begin to live more positively with Covid so that the parishes throughout the diocese can begin slowly yet cautiously to return to normal. It is clear that some people have found themselves distanced from the church for whatever reason or that they have become attached to on-line streaming. Can I ask that we all make an extra effort to encourage people back to Mass. Maybe you know someone who could do with some support in this direction?

It is my prayer for the parish that a good and faithful priest will be found to serve you all. Sometimes the best things are worth waiting for!
