First Holy Communion candidates and their families

Solemnity of the MOST HOLY BODY AND BLOOD OF CHRIST (Year C) – 'Corpus Christi' The readings for today's Mass are to be found in the red Year C Parish Mass Book pp. 84—6

The thing which Catholics – and indeed many Anglicans and certainly Orthodox – most missed most during the rollercoaster of lockdowns and partial liftings of measures was being able to *attend* the Eucharist on Sunday and *receive* Holy Communion. Many Christian news outlets that conducted research on how the Catholic and other ecclesial communities coped during the Covid-19 period have been without ambivalence in their conclusion: Catholics felt *deprived* of Mass and were *distressed* not to be able to receive the Blessed Sacrament of the Lord.

Jesus instituted the Eucharist at the Last Supper, and He specifically asked his disciples to break bread in memory of Him. It was thus a *real* deprivation for parish communities not to be able to gather to celebrate the Eucharist especially on either day when *that institution* is especially remembered – Holy Thursday and this special feast. It was established in the 13th century precisely so that people would not forget that Jesus – His body, blood, soul and divinity – is really, truly and substantially present under the appearances of bread and wine in the Eucharist. A huge debate raged from the eleventh century onwards among theologians at the medieval universities about precisely that issue: in what way can we understand, and what philosophical language can help us *articulate*, the belief of the Church concerning Jesus's promised presence in the Eucharist.

St Thomas Aquinas helped solve the intellectual, academic issue by propounding the teaching of 'trans-substantiation'. It was a means of understanding and articulating a reality: never anything more than the explanation that comes closest to the truth of the mystery, not, itself, dogma!). But it was Pope Urban IV who encouraged that the debate be solved through prayer and devotion, and in 1264 he thus instituted the Feast of Corpus Christi (for which St Thomas Aquinas wrote a set of now-famous hymns). Thanks be to God streamed and make a spiritual communion. The rest of us can rejoice that there is no reason why we should not prepare ourselves, confess our sins and be reconciled to God, and feed on the word and sacrament of God at Mass, as God invites and urges us to.

But how quickly some of us have forgotten that 'pandemic feeling' of being hungry for the Mass, for Christ's unique transforming *presence* in our lives. How quickly some have all too readily returned to 'normal'. 'For this reason', says St Paul to St Timothy (2 Tim 1.6) 'I remind you to fan into flame the gift of God, which is in you ... for God did not give us a spirit of fear but of power and love and self-control.' Today is an opportunity to renew our love for Christ.

**First Reading (OT): Genesis 14.18—20** Melchizedek is a *very* enigmatic ancient figure. There is not space here to unravel the mystery surrounding him! ... but he represents one of three different ways of sacrifice we find in the Old Testament period (all of them mentioned in the First Eucharistic Prayer). Abel is associated with *blood* sacrifice, Abraham with *voluntary* sacrifice, *Melchizedek*,

who offers bread and wine, is associated with sacramental and un-bloody sacrifice (Gen 14:18). That Melchizedek's sacrifice is 'eternal' makes him symbolic of Christ (Heb 7:3); he is also a priest and a king (Gen 14:18); and, like Jesus, his ancestry is different from the Jewish priesthood of the tribe of Levi (Heb 7:14-18). Hence, "You are a priest forever after the order of Melchizedek."

**Second Reading (NT): 1 Corinthians 11.23-26** This brief recollection of Paul concerning the Last Supper suggests that Eucharist is always something celebrated in common, something shared and that the one bread and one cup make us one in the mystical Body of Christ. The new Mass lectionary (used by more than Catholics) has often been criticised—and quite rightly!—for *omitting* a crucial Pauline teaching in verses 27-32, which *ought* to be read in church, but never is. It is a very important warning: "Whoever, therefore, eats the bread or drinks the cup of the Lord in an unworthy manner will be guilty concerning the body and blood of the Lord. Let a person therefore examine himself, and so eat of the bread and drink of the cup. For anyone who eats and drinks without discerning the body eats and drinks judgment on himself." It is one of the bases of confession of grave sin before communion. Worth us really taking very seriously, no?

**Gospel:** Luke 9.11—17 This is one of the many stories in the Gospels of a miraculous feeding by Jesus. The Eucharist was plainly a major theme in the infant Church's teaching and memory of Jesus – 'Do this'. From the earliest moment, was ever a command so obeyed?

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## **Prayer of Preparation before each Sunday Mass**

After this prayer until the bell at the start of Mass is an opportunity to pray silently together in preparation.

ALMIGHTY GOD, to whom all hearts are open, all desires known, and from whom no secrets are hidden; cleanse the thoughts of our hearts by the inspiration of your Holy Spirit, so that we may truly love you and worthily praise your holy name; through our Saviour, Jesus Christ. Amen.
