ORDER OF MASS See the gold Parish Mass Book – start on p.7; then, after the Bidding Prayers, go to p.15; then, from the Lord's Prayer, p.56. The readings are to be found pp.178--189

The psalm response is 'My God, my God, why have you forsaken me?'

During the dramatic reading of the Passion according to Matthewbeginning on page 184—PLEASE READ TOGETHER, loudly and clearly, the parts marked 'C in the book': that is, the parts for the Crowd.

**REFLECTIONS on today's readings** There are two centres of gravity in the liturgy we celebrate today, each with a Gospel reading. First, there's the festive entry of Jesus into Jerusalem, where a joyous throng hails Him as a king. And yet He is very different from the other monarchs of his time. He enters Jerusalem—the city of the kings of Israel—on a donkey. The second high point is our commemoration of the Lord's passion and death. Enthusiasm, euphoria and hope swiftly moves by Good Friday to fear, sorrow and despair, which overtakes the crowds and Jesus's disciples in different ways. A liturgy of deep contrasts: ranging from the ecstatic hope for freedom to betrayal and scapegoating of an innocent victim.

1 Palm Gospel: Matthew 21.1—11 The ass and her colt play a key role in Jesus' entry into Jerusalem. From Antiquity to a couple of centuries ago, monarchs entered cities high on a horse, with all the glamour of a conqueror. All too often monarchs exploited the very people who praised their victory procession. Jesus entered Jerusalem without any such sign of power, fulfilling the prophecy of Zechariah: 'Your king is approaching, vindicated and victorious, but humble and riding on a donkey.'

2 First Reading: Isaiah 50.4–7 Resistance to injustice and violence against the poor and oppressed is a virtue. But in this extract, the Lord's 'Suffering Servant' puts up no resistance. He brings to mind those who are too drained of energy to resist. And God is on their side, His solidarity is with them. He will see to it that they will come into their own, their shame removed.

3 Second Reading: Philippians 2.6–11 This is likely an early hymn which Paul inserted in his letter to Philippi, and one of the oldest texts in the new testament. It probably formed a part of the earliest liturgy celebrated in the communities of the early Church within a generation of Jesus' death. It relates the abnegation of Jesus, acknowledges the historical fact of his death by crucifixion, but celebrates his entry into glory (as a consequence of fulfilling the Father's will and offering up his life for the salvation of mankind).

4 The Passion according to Matthew 26.14—27.66 St Matthew, whose Gospel we are hearing this year, mentions two small events that have a prophetic character and make clear to us Jesus' true will. Immediately after Jesus' words on the 'house of prayer for all the people', Matthew continues, 'And the blind and the lame came to Him in the Temple, and He healed them.' Jesus counters the corruption of trade in religion with his <a href="healing">healing</a> goodness. This is the temple's true purification. Jesus dedicates himself to those who, because of their ailments, were driven to the margins of society till the ends of their lives.

And then there are children who pay homage to Jesus as the Son of David and acclaim him with Hosanna. Jesus had said that to enter the Kingdom of God it was essential to become once again like children. To encounter God it is necessary to be able to see with the heart. We must learn to see with a child's heart, with a youthful heart not hampered by prejudices or blinded by ego and interest.
