LENT: PRAY, FAST, GIVE

TODAY: FIRST SUNDAY IN LENT The Order of Mass can be followed in the gold Parish Mass Book – first from **p.7**; then, after the Bidding Prayers – from **p.15**; then, from the Lord's Prayer – **p.56**.

- The readings for today's Mass are to be found pp.151—154
- Today's psalm response is, 'Have mercy on us Lord, for we have sinned.'

PREPARATION FOR MASS ALMIGHTY GOD, to whom all hearts are open, all desires known, and from whom no secrets are hidden; cleanse the thoughts of our hearts by the inspiration of your Holy Spirit, that we may perfectly love you, and worthily magnify your holy name; through Christ our Lord. **Amen.** After the prayer, please keep silent until the bell begins the Mass.

AFTER THE 10am MASS ... in the Parish Hall – refreshments and chance to connect. Everyone is very welcome.

Reflection on the readings Today we accompany Jesus into the desert. Since Ash Wednesday we have been beginning our Lenten (that is 'springtime') fast. It's for all Christians, from the youngest to the oldest, but appropriate of course to our age, health and circumstances. Who isn't aware that every day we face temptations? and we're very alert to the fact that the Lord's call to conversion of heart (which we heard on Ash Wednesday: Matt 6.1-6, 16-18), and his instruction to Fast, Pray and Give requires changes to our lives. The traditional Lenten observance involves changes to our outer behaviour, but that's why Jesus stresses that God sees what is done in secret – because it's inner conversion and change that matters. Living in a fast-changing world, we are easily made to feel insecure. Temptations are ever present; advertising feeds our fears of missing out. One of the greatest temptations is to lose our trust and faith in God, and put it in things, people, or securities. Lent's spiritual challenge is to us to deepen our faith in God and to submit ourselves to His will.

First Reading (OT): Genesis 2.7–9, 3.1–7 It is the *temptation* story in this reading which seizes our immediate attention, especially in the light of the Gospel narrative recounting Jesus' desert temptations. But this passage also contains one of the two creation stories, in particular that of us human beings. On Ash Wednesday we were reminded that we were *created* out of dust and that ultimately into dust we shall *return*. God has fashioned us with his own hands. Dust itself is without form, it slips through our fingers, it is lifeless. And yet in God's hands, dust can be transformed, into a being destined for eternal life – the human being. Out of nothing we have been

fashioned into something, each one a unique person, each infinitely precious to God.

Second Reading (NT): Romans **5.12–19** This excerpt from Paul's great letter to the Church community in Rome presents us with a summary of the salvation drama. Through one man (Adam – all humanity) sin entered the world, the relationship established by God at the dawn of creation had been fractured; and through another man, born from above but who called *himself* 'Son of Man', victory was won over sin and the relationship with God restored.

Gospel: Matthew 4.1–11 This Gospel passage today helps us to think afresh about the role of temptation in our lives and what it did for Jesus. Is this story one of low-level temptation (like we might be drawn by chocolate early in Lent when we had decided to forego chocolate for 40 days)? Isn't this more of a crisis of Jesus's meaning or purpose? And if so, isn't temptation more significant for us than we normally allow? In the OT all the great figures, Adam, Abraham, Joseph, Moses, David, Job, Jeremiah, had been put to the test by God. Just before the pandemic there was great debate over the way the Holy Father approved an alternative wording for the Italian text of the Lord's Prayer: 'do not let us fall to temptation'. Yet, this morning we hear St Matthew say very clearly 'Jesus was led by the Spirit into the wilderness to be tempted by the devil.' He identified unconditionally with us. Indeed the author of the Letter to the Hebrews understood that '[Jesus] himself suffered when He was tempted, and so He is able to help those who are being tempted.'
