REFLECTIONS on today's Scriptures The thing which Catholic, Orthodox and many if not all Anglicans most missed during the various bouts of social lock-down was being able to be present at Mass on Sunday and receive Holy Communion. The lack was all the sharper precisely because we were experiencing together a major social upheaval, and a threat to many lives.

Jesus instituted the Eucharist at the Last Supper and he specifically asked his disciples to repeat his actions to recall His constant promise to be with them. As St Paul underlined (I Cor II), Jesus said "This is my body; it's for you! Do this as a memorial of me" And, after supper, "This cup is the new covenant in my blood; whenever you drink this cup, do this as a memorial of me."

From the 11th century onwards a major debate raged in the universities: in what way can we understand, and in what language can we best express, the Church's belief that Jesus is *present* in the Eucharist. By the 13th century St Thomas Aquinas had helped solve the intellectual issue with a philosophical explanation that comes closest to the truth of the mystery. But it was Pope Urban IV who encouraged the debate to be resolved through prayer and devotion. And thus in 1264 he inaugurated the Feast

of Corpus Christi (for which St Thomas wrote the famous hymns so familiar to Catholics).

A Pew Forum survey three or four years back revealed a startling statistic: that 69% of American Catholics do not believe in the Real Presence of Christ in the Eucharist. For them, is the Eucharist merely a symbol of Christ? and the Mass simply a collection of like-minded individuals gathering to remember His life and legacy? What—we have to wonder—would the percentage be here in Westminster? The US bishops have taken this as a wake-up call to the spiritual disaster of such a loss of faith. That loss of faith wasn't the issue in the middle ages; but it is the issue now. It is the issue this feast addresses today. The Eucharist is held by Catholics to be "the source and summit of the Christian life." The root and the fruit we might say. Is it? What should we do? ... we, here at St William's, to assess how deep this crisis is here, and its impact on our faith and witness? St Paul was clear: if "you eat and drink without recognizing the body, you eat and drink judgement on yourselves." (1 Cor 11.29)

First Reading: Deuteronomy 8.2–3, 14–16 Moses articulates here the invitation, issued to devout Jews each year on the occasion of the Passover festival, to remember how God accompanied their ancestors through the Red Sea to freedom. This text may well have been read at the Last Supper.

Second Reading: I Corinthians 10.16–17 St Paul begins his challenge to the Corinthians about their seriousness about the body and blood of the Lord which lasts for two chapters. "The cup of blessing – it is a sharing in the blood of Christ - isn't it? The broken bread, a sharing in His body - isn't it?"

Gospel: John 6.51–58 Jesus leaves his hearers in no doubt: "Just as the living Father sent me and I live because of Him; so the one who eats me will live because of me, and ... share the life of God's new age."

There is a mandatory collection next Sunday 18 June which is for the annual Day for Life. This year the three episcopal conferences in Britain and Ireland are marking the Day together — a stronger public sign of witness to the gospel of life. This year the Day for Life seeks to highlight the trauma caused by abortion, inspired by comments from Pope Francis both about the gravity of abortion and the magnitude of God's mercy.

The Bishops invite us to listen to the story of a young Catholic woman who was suffering after an abortion and found healing. They were inspired towards this message because of the ever-rising number of abortions across our nations, the impact of 'tele-medicine' after the pandemic, and stories of post-abortive trauma from trusted agencies who accompany women.
