A WARM WELCOME to Mass today, especially if you are new to the parish. **Please take this newsletter home** and use the calendar in your daily prayer.

• Before Mass, when the tower bell rings, pray together: ALMIGHTY GOD, to whom all hearts are open, all desires known, and from whom no secrets are hidden; cleanse the thoughts of our hearts, by the inspiration of your Holy Spirit, that we may perfectly love you, and worthily magnify your holy name; through Christ our Lord. Please, let's now keep silence until Mass begins.



- ◆ Parents and carers please do what you need to keep children content and quiet. Do not hesitate to move around at the back of the church. (The service is amplified into the Narthex too.) And, for everybody's safety, please accompany any child who needs to use the toilet. Thanks.
- The ORDER of Mass on the new pew Mass Card.
- ◆ Today's readings are to be found on pp.155-57 of the Parish Mass Book. The psalm response is: 'O blessed are those who fear the Lord.'
- ◆ **AFTER** the **I0am Mass** Drinks, often cakes, and *always* a chance to catch up and share fellowship.

REFLECTIONS on today's scriptures The word of God of this Sunday (the second to last of the liturgical year) warns us of the briefness of our earthly existence and invites us to live our lives as a *pilgrimage*, keeping our gaze fixed on the *destination* for which God created us. Meanwhile, 'as we await the blessed hope and the coming of our Saviour, Jesus Christ', we're encouraged to be vigilant and hardworking. Since both our personal deaths and judgement, and the Lord's coming and the Last Judgement, will come 'like a thief in the night (that is when you're not ready), we must live watchfully, not forgetfully. This is the perspective of the first two readings: from Proverbs and St Paul.

So far so good, but what does Jesus make of this perspective on life? In the well-known Parable of the Talents Jesus draws a picture of three servants, to whom their master entrusted his property before he set out on a long journey. Two of them behaved impeccably, doubling the value of what they had received. The third didn't – he simply buried the money he received in a hole! On his return, the

master asked his servants for an account of what they had done with what he had entrusted to them. And while he was pleased with the first two, he was disappointed with the third.

Indeed, the 'third man' calculated badly. He behaved as if his master would never return, as if there would never be a day on which he would be asked to account for his actions. With this parable Jesus wanted to teach his disciples to make good use of his gifts. He had after all chosen them in order to give them gifts; gifts that would make them apostles; gifts that would make the Church apostolic.

These are not the things we mean when we say that someone is a gifted person - having a natural talent for this or that. We are talking about spiritual gifts, from the Holy Spirit for our spirits and characters.

WARS DON'T STOP For use daily at home Perhaps keep this near your TV or radio and pray in response to news?

Prayer for Israel-Gaza Mother of God and our Mother. Queen of Peace, we appeal for peace in the Holy Land! Touch the hearts of those imprisoned by hatred: turn those who fuel and foment conflict. Be present to the suffering: strengthen the wounded and the sick; protect those forced to leave their lands and their loved ones; give grace to every need. Through Christ our Lord.

Peace in Ukraine Mother of God, Our Lady of Kiev, intercede for the people of Ukraine and their government, and all who suffer as a result of war. Be with them as you stood by your Son. Give them strength and courage to believe, to hope, to act justly. May we in our turn support them through prayer and generosity: so that lives may be saved, injuries healed, the dead may rest in peace, and there will be just peace after war. Through Christ our Lord.

And the primary gift of God, as we are reminded at every Mass, is not life, work, family, justice, freedom, or peace; the greatest is love - God's love poured into our hearts, and poured in words and actions into the hearts of others.

In commenting on this Gospel passage St Gregory the Great noted that the Lord ensures that no one lacks the gift of His charity, of His love. 'If someone loses this gift that God has given him, he loses every good he possesses, he is deprived of the talent he received, and finds himself in darkness.

Friends, let us accept the invitation to be watchful, which the Scriptures constantly remind us of! Because that is the attitude of those who know that the Lord will return and that He will wish to see the fruits of His love in us.

Looking ahead to Mark from 3 December the Church will begin reading St Mark at Sunday Masses. Why not start as you mean to go on? and invest in knowing this gospel (which is the shortest) a bit better. There are 167 commentaries on the market!
