A WARM WELCOME to Mass today, especially if you are new to the parish. Please take this newsletter home and use the calendar in your daily prayer.

- Before Mass, when the tower bell begins to ring: ALMIGHTY GOD, to whom all hearts are open, all desires known, and from whom no secrets are hidden; cleanse the thoughts of our hearts, by the inspiration of your Holy Spirit, that we may perfectly love you, and worthily magnify your holy name; through Christ our Lord. Please, now keep silence together until Mass begins.
- Parents and carers, during Mass please feel free to do what you need to keep children quiet and content. Do not hesitate to move around with them. (The service is "piped" into the Narthex too.) And, for everybody's safety, please accompany any child who needs to use the toilet while you're in church. Thanks.
- ◆ The ORDER of Mass is in the orange Parish Mass Book. Start on p.7; then, after the Creed, go to p.15; and then, from the Lord's Prayer, go to p.56.
- ◆ Today's readings are to be found pp.122-25 of the Parish Mass Book. And the psalm response is:
 For You my soul is thirsting, O Lord my God.
- ◆ **AFTER the 10am Mass**, refreshments and an opportunity to meet in the Church Hall.

REFLECTIONS on today's Scriptures - Jeremiah 20.7-9; Romans 12.1-2; Matthew 16.21-27 In today's Gospel Jesus explains to his disciples that he must 'go to Jerusalem ... suffer many things from the chief priests and scribes ... be killed, and ... on the third day be raised' (Mt 16:21).

Everything seems to have been turned upside down in the disciples' hearts! How could last Sunday's declaration, 'You are Christ, the Son of the living God' (v. 16) have become Christ sufferer unto death? Power become weakness; glory become disgrace?

So, understandably, the apostle Peter rebels. He refuses to accept Jesus's destiny, His course of action. He rebukes his Teacher saying: "God forbid, Lord! This shall never happen to you." (v. 22). The gulf between the Father's loving plan on the one hand (which even went as far as the gift of the Only-Begotten Son 'to the very limit' to save humanity), and the disciples' expectations, wishes and projects on the other, is deep and wide. And in our lives today this gulf is repeated: when the reasonable fulfilment of human life is aimed

exclusively at social success, and physical and financial well-being, we stop reasoning according to the mind of God but according to men (v. 23). Thinking as the rest of the world thinks involves setting God aside, not accepting his plan, preventing him, let's say, from doing his wise will in your life. For this reason lesus turns on Peter with a particularly sharp rebuke: "No! Satan! Get behind me! In front of me and you're a barricade". The Lord teaches that the way of discipleship literally involves getting behind lesus, staying there, and learning to follow! In all three Gospels this decision to follow on the path toward the Cross is "the indispensable way for man to 'lose his own life', without which he'll never truly 'find' himself' (Pope Benedict, Jesus of Nazareth, p. 287).

As he invited the disciples, Jesus also addresses us: "If any of you would come after me, let him deny himself and take up his cross and *follow* me" (Mt 16:24). When a Christian lovingly shoulders his own cross, which people motivated by worldly values see as some kind

of defeat or surrender, he or she knows that they are not carrying it alone, but with Jesus, sharing his same journey of self-giving. "In a mysterious way", wrote St Paul VI, "Christ himself accepts death, in order to remove from man's heart the sins of self-reliance and autonomy, and to reveal to the Father a complete filial obedience" (1975).

St Cyril of Jerusalem commented: "The luminous glory of the Cross steered into the light those whose ignorance had left them blind, released all who were gripped by sin" (Catechesis).

Dear friends, let us entrust our prayers to the Virgin Mary, so that each one of us may be able to follow the Lord on the way of the cross and let ourselves be transformed by divine grace, renewing — as St Paul says in the liturgy today — our minds so that we "may prove what is the will of God, what is good and acceptable and perfect" (Rom 12:2).
