REFLECTIONS on today's scriptures We're only at the end of the first full week of Lent and it comes as no surprise that some of the promises made as we received Ashes on our heads are a bit shaky, our Lenten feet getting a bit weary. Jesus had set out on a journey to Jerusalem that he'd hinted might be his last. The apostles must have felt dispirited but perplexed too. Why was Jesus so bent on going up to Jerusalem – going

into 'enemy territory'? The invitation to Peter, James and John to climb Mount Tabor was designed to lift their spirits, and to help them, during His passion, to understand why He was so resolute: namely, hope of resurrection and a radically new horizon of life. What the Transfiguration kindled in those three men, can give our hearts courage and hope also, and grace for our Lenten resolutions.

after I 0am Mass today (25th). Two themes; two questions each.

Conversation Theme 1: Shared responsibility (20 mins)

Every member of the Body of Christ has a unique mission to proclaim Christ, sharing responsibility for the Church's mission overall

Q.1: How <u>do we</u> witness as a Parish and proclaim our faith to 1) those who have never heard of Christ? 2) lost contact with Christ? 3) those with whom we worship?

**Q.2:** How <u>should we</u> organise ourselves as a Parish to do this more effectively?

#### Conversation Theme 2: Equipped and ready (20 mins)

To enable each person to participate actively in the Church's mission, according to his or her own gifts and calling, they need to be equipped **Q.3:** What concrete steps/formation opportunities would help us begin to witness and proclaim our faith more effectively?

**Q.4:** What structures may need to change? How might we need to develop the way we are organised currently?

give him offspring that would become a nation. Now God is apparently asking for the life of his only son, Isaac. The Lord was not asking for Isaac, but for Abraham's total trust. That is why Abraham is called 'our father in faith'.

Second Reading (NT) Romans 8.31–34 St Paul (Saul), a most learned Jew, would have known the Abraham story intimately. He knew God did not desire Isaac's death any more than Abraham did. He likewise understood, that God did not desire Jesus's death either. But since the crucifixion was both the inevitable fate of God's love incarnate in the world, and the only means of Jesus remaining faithful to His mission, God the Father accepted Jesus's <u>self-offering</u>. Paul saw this as ultimate proof of God's love for sinful humanity. If God <u>will</u> give His Belovèd to death, will he deny us anything?

Gospel: Mark 9.2–10 This extraordinary happening occurs just over half-way through the gospels that include it: Matthew, Mark, and Luke. Jesus had already revealed to his disciples that he was the longed-for Messiah. He now wanted them to understand Messiah's mission: that is, to reveal God by suffering not stardom. He had mentioned to them for a first time that he will have to endure unjust suffering in Jerusalem. To put this in its true perspective, He took the same disciples He would take with Him to pray in Gethsemene, up a different mountain to see His true, inner glory. Seeing Him in this divine light might help them recognise the same light in the horrors of Calvary.
