REFLECTIONS on today's scriptures In many parts of the Church, 6 January (Twelfth Night), Epiphany, is celebrated as the Christmas feast. This is true of the churches of the East. In Ireland it was celebrated as Nollag na mBan (Women's Christmas) in acknowledgement of how hard women had worked during the first eleven days for their husbands and children, now was their occasion to enjoy Christmas. But there is a theological justification for this second Christmas festival as well. On Christmas night the birth of the Saviour was revealed to the Jewish people in the person of the shepherds to whom the Christmas proclamation was announced and for whom the heavenly choirs sang. On the Epiphany the Saviour was revealed to the non-Jewish world, the heathens or pagans: our forefathers. Epiphany marks the moment of revelation of the Saviour to the whole world.

First Reading: Isaiah 60.1–6 Darkness hangs over the pagan world. That pagans lived in darkness was self-evident to the ancient Jews. But Isaiah promises that even the pagans will see light, recognise it, pursue it. The light hovers over Israel, yet it is not Israel which is the source of that light, it is the refracted

glory of the Lord and all peoples are capable of seeing it, of being enlightened by it and of doing great things for God. This is a reading of great hope: none are excluded from God's light nor prevented from recognising and discovering Him.

Second Reading: Ephesians 3.2–6 The new testament is full of amazement at the fact that *pagans* can also share in God's love for–and promise to–ancient Israel, despite the fact that the old testament had always contained the idea that God would reveal himself to the whole world, that none were beyond the reach of his providential grace. But that amazement is because of the way the promise was fulfilled. It is not as servants, but as 'sons' (and daughters) with Christ that the promise is fulfilled.

Gospel: Matthew 2.1–12 The shepherds were sent to the manger by angelic message and emotion. The magi were drawn to Bethlehem by astronomical signs, their intelligence, and their fascination. But that got them only so far. They went first to a palace; but the star took them to a stable. Their understanding was transformed by their search. The shepherds, glorified God. The magi fell down, and worshipped.
